## Concerning Operations of the Central A.A. Office of Omaha

Issued for the information of A.A. Members, whose participation in the maintenance of the Central Office, makes it possible for us - "To do unto other alcoholics what has been done for us."

## The Four Functions of the Central Office

# FIRST FUNCTION - PUBLICITY:

a. All Alcoholics in Omaha, Council Bluffs and surrounding territory, who are having trouble with drink and need the help of Alcoholics Anonymous, should be given a chance to know that the help is available to them. 32

It is the Function of the Central Office to bring to their attention Through various forms of Publicity and Direct Advertising, information about Alcohol-

ics Anonymous.

Selection of the best methods to be used to publicize and advertise that help which we have for them is one of the Functions of the Central Office.

#### SECOND FUNCTION - TWELFTH STEP ACTIVATION:

Inquiries for help which are received as a result of such Publicity should be

given proper attention and be handled effectively.

Every Member of Alcoholics Anonymous in this territory is interested in doing 12th Step Work and should be given the opportunity to perform Twelfth Step . Service in connection with such inquiries for help; this is possible through orderly rotation of Twelve Step assignments.

Every Member of A.A. should be encouraged to do 12th Step Work and be instructed

in how to become an effective Sponsor.

It is the Function of the Central Office to evolve plans of procedure on how best to do this, based on recommendations received through the Membership.

#### THIRD FUNCTION - EDUCATION:

After Twelfth Steppers complete the initial part of their service of contacting persons and influencing them to participate in the A.A. Program, the task of thorough indoctrination and continued education begins.

Such continuous education is carried on in A.A. Meetings, both Group and Central

Meetings, plus publications; lectures and bulletins.

It is the Function of the Central Office to inform itself as to the regularity of attendance of new Members at these Meetings, and to do all possible to encourage regular attendance by working with and through Secretaries of Groups to which Members belong.

#### FOURTH FUNCTION - MAINTAINING RECORDS:

Information concerning all the above activities, what is being done, what is being accomplished, is necessary to guide the Central Office in functioning properly, and such information requires the making of Records.

It is the Function of the Central Office to keep Records from which necessary

information can be found at all times.

In addition, the Central Office maintains telephone service through which inquiries for help from Omaha, Council Bluffs and all other towns in Nebraska and Southwestern Iowa can be received and properly attended to.

- 2 The Secretary to operate this Center under the daily supervision of an executive body of
- 3 Three Inter-Group TRUSTEES, original selection and terms of office to be determined by this Control Committee. Terms should be overlapping. Trustees will consult with and be guided by
- 4 An INTER-GROUP DELEGATES COUNCIL, composed of one delegate from every active, participating Group in the area. Council should hold monthly general meeting.

The duties and responsibilities of this Council and the Trustees are - "management of common AA problems....intergroup meetings, hospital arrangements, local public relations, a central office for interviews and information, are things in which every AA is interested, whether he has any use for clubs or not. Central or intergroup committee has to be elected and financed to look after them. The groups of an area will usually support with group funds these truly central activities. Even though the club is still large enough for intergroup meetings and these meetings are still held, the center of gravity for the area will continue to shift to the intergroup committee and its central activities. The club is left definitely outside; where, in the opinion of many, it should be".
